

- 5. Intended learning objectives:
  - To understand the key principles and concepts of project management
  - To understand the project management lifecycle for effective research project management
  - To develop a plan, execute, and monitor progress of a research project across the lifecycle
  - To plan and establish a team who will implement the research project
  - To acquire practice skills by using basic project management tools
  - To reflect upon and learn to use qualities of a good project manager
- 6. Course delivery dates: June 2025- September 2025
- 7. **Course details**: 5 live interactive sessions (conducted via zoom) + 4 pre-recorded sessions + 3 group assignment + reading material + 1 end of course quiz
- 8. Total contact hours: 8.25 hrs (6.25 hrs live session + 2 hrs pre-recorded session)
- 9. **Assignment details**: All participants were divided in cross-country groups to complete the assignments (given in the form of case studies) for each module and present them during the live session.
  - At the end of the course all participants were required to complete a multi-choice question guiz with a minimum score of 75%.
- 10. Total enrolled and completed: Enrolled-31 participants, Completed-25 participants (81%)

#### Participant details

 An expression of interest was sought for the course from all partner institutes for enrollment. The total number of enrolled participants in the course was 31 (including 8 people from outside the Centre)






















2. Attendance of live interactive sessions(n=5)



3. 25 participants (81 %) successfully completed the course meeting the course completion criteria attending 3/6 live session, participating in 3 out of 4 group assignments and successfully completing the end of course quiz and were eligible for course certificates.






# Participant Feedback

Feedback was collected anonymously from participants using feedback form via the Moodle platform. 96% participants (24/25) who completed the course provided the feedback.

**98%** participants responded agreed/strongly agreed to the general feedback questions, while response was recorded satisfied/extremely satisfied by **97%** participants for satisfaction related questions.





















## Qualitative feedback

#### Valuable part about the training

- Discussions during live interactive sessions and course material shared by faculty
- Cross country assignment group and live feedback during the sessions after team presentations
- Introduction to frameworks like RACI
- Learning practical tools like Gantt charts and risk matrices that simplify project planning and execution

#### Application of new knowledge and skills gained

- Designing and implementing new projects
- Breaking up task in current project realistically to achieve objectives timely
- Establishing a structured implementation and monitoring plan for the management of current project
- Managing field level project activities and staff
- Setting up a new team and task distribution within the team members

## **Suggestions for improvement:**

- An advance level course for project management would be beneficial
- Additional follow up sessions and reading material to help reinforce the concepts learned
- Sessions could be of slightly longer duration
- Improved inter-country communication so that team members can come together and complete group work more effectively
- Participants also suggested some additional topics on which sessions can be organized, these include the following:
  - Ethical issues of project management
  - Use of web-based project management tool
  - o Management of data flow
  - o Case studies on handling specific challenges in project management

#### **Key learnings**

The creation of cross-country groups for assignments provided an opportunity for the course participants to collaborate and share ideas. The assignments were given in the form of case-studies using real-world project examples. Different team members were requested to present the assignment at each session, providing opportunities for all members of the group to also develop their presentation skills.
